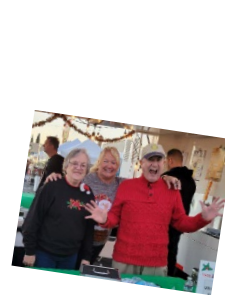

Club & Community News

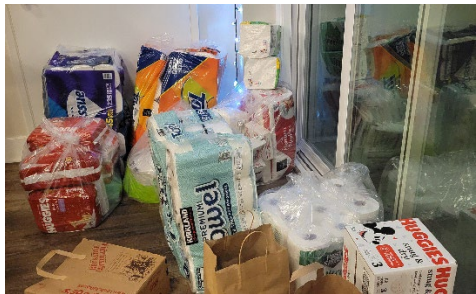

Previous week's Program

Fire Marshall Amanda Horner

Amanda Horner is Placentia Fire & Life Safety Department's Fire Marshall. She holds a Masters degree in Public Administration, and has held similar posts with other fire units. During our meeting of 12/6, she spoke to us regarding various aspects of community safety.

The primary function of fire codes is to keep both the firefighter and the community (public) safe. Much of the regulations and codes concern safe access and visibility, including fire protection systems, uniform color-coding systems, markings, and signage.

Fire inspectors review how various items are stored, marked, and utilized : combustibles, how things are stacked and potential for interference for emergency exits, compost piles, extension cords and surge protectors.

The fire department are involved or consulted in new construction: fire/emergency access issues may "kill" a project, all construction plans are reviewed, and sites inspected for compliance. Note: the State establishes general fire codes based on type of occupancy, but local jurisdiction may be more stringent – the City of

Placentia is one such city which holds higher standards.

Amanda, and the fire department, participates in community education, particularly at special community events, school visits and the like.
