Previous Week's Program

Teri NiebuhrUpdate on Santa Angelina Apartment Project

Teri is a prior member of our Rotary club, as the director of HIS House. She is a 25-year active member of the Episcopal Church of the Blessed Sacrament and Learning School, the site of the Santa Angelina Senior Apartment Homes.



Teri is Long Beach-born and raised, and is a graduate of CSULB. Her interest in the plight of the homeless led her to her involvement and becoming a part of HIS House.



Blessed Sacrament sits on a large property which they felt might offer an opportunity to better respond to the needs of the community. They were able to partner with National Community Renaissance (National CORE) in developing the Santa Angelina Senior Apartments, 65 apartments for low income seniors. Some of the residents were formally unhoused, some with various disabilities and challenges. Special care and attention in the planning had to be mindful of the existing on-site daycare and pre-school.

The project includes a new, improved facilities for the church: new parish hall and a new pre-school building with a lunchroom for the children. The Santa Angelina development has (1) studio, the balance are either 1 or 2 bedroom units. Amenities for the residents include an on-site dog park, a garden area, laundry facilities, and support services.

National CORE has several other community projects on-going or planned in Orange County, many in conjunction with the Episcopal Church. Its Hope Through Housing Foundation motto is "Together,

we transform lives and communities." Its Pillars of Hope are: to maintain senior health and wellness; Bright Futures; Pathways; and Unlocking Opportunities to foster stability.

Ribbon-cutting ceremonies will be held on Monday 5/13 at 11:30 am. The 21 previously unhoused will begin moving into the apartments in mid-March. Teri provided a list of needs which the club may consider filling.
