

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<u>Previous Week's Program</u>

PPD Officer Brian Drew Homeless Liaison Officer

Officer Brian Drew was hired into the Placentia Police Department 19 years ago as a patrol officer - by our own Ward Smith, then police chief. Today, he serves as the Homeless Liaison Officer, coordinating with the Fullerton, Brea, Stanton and Buena Park police departments, and with the Navigation Center here in Placentia.



Sleeping in public places is illegal, but non-enforceable IF beds are not available (e.g. at the Navigation Center).

Officer Drew has attended specialized training courses, such as working with schizophrenics who are often cycling on & off through medical drugs to control their disease. He notes that, despite one's desire to help or offer aid, homeless encampments are NOT safe places for an untrained person to go. Often donations of food, clothing or other goods are often not appreciated, as these are additional encumberances to carry or move; cash may be desirable (to those who have addictions). A "social" hierarchy exists within a homeless community, which may be based upon a number of factors, resulting in moving from camp to camp.

Typically, even shelters have limitations on how long a person may remain at a given location. The new HOPE Center (Homeless Outreach & Proactive Engagement) has created a unified "hub" to align outreach efforts in efficient response to non-emergency situations, addressing welfare, protective custody, and safety concerns. The goal is to eventually serve 13 cities in North OC, with non-emergency, non-violent dispatch service, rather than police response.

* * * * * * Paul Alexander – Iron Lung Man

Polio survivor Paul Alexander passed away on March 11th. Who was he? He was the last man to live in an iron lung, contracting polio at the age of 6, and living 72 years with the aid of an iron lung. He was paralyzed from the neck down. He learned to breathe in a specialized manner, such that he was able to leave the iron lung for short periods during his waking hours, but had to sleep in it. He was able to do this, relying on a wheelchair for mobility for several years, but in recent years had to return to fulltime use. He had a strong will, however, and became a lawyer and a writer.

The iron lung was developed in 1927, and is a negative pressure ventilator, increasing and decreasing air pressure within its chamber, thereby causing the chest (and lungs) to deflate, then expand, as the diaphragm could not so function. Later ventilators operated via positive pressure, but are more invasive.
